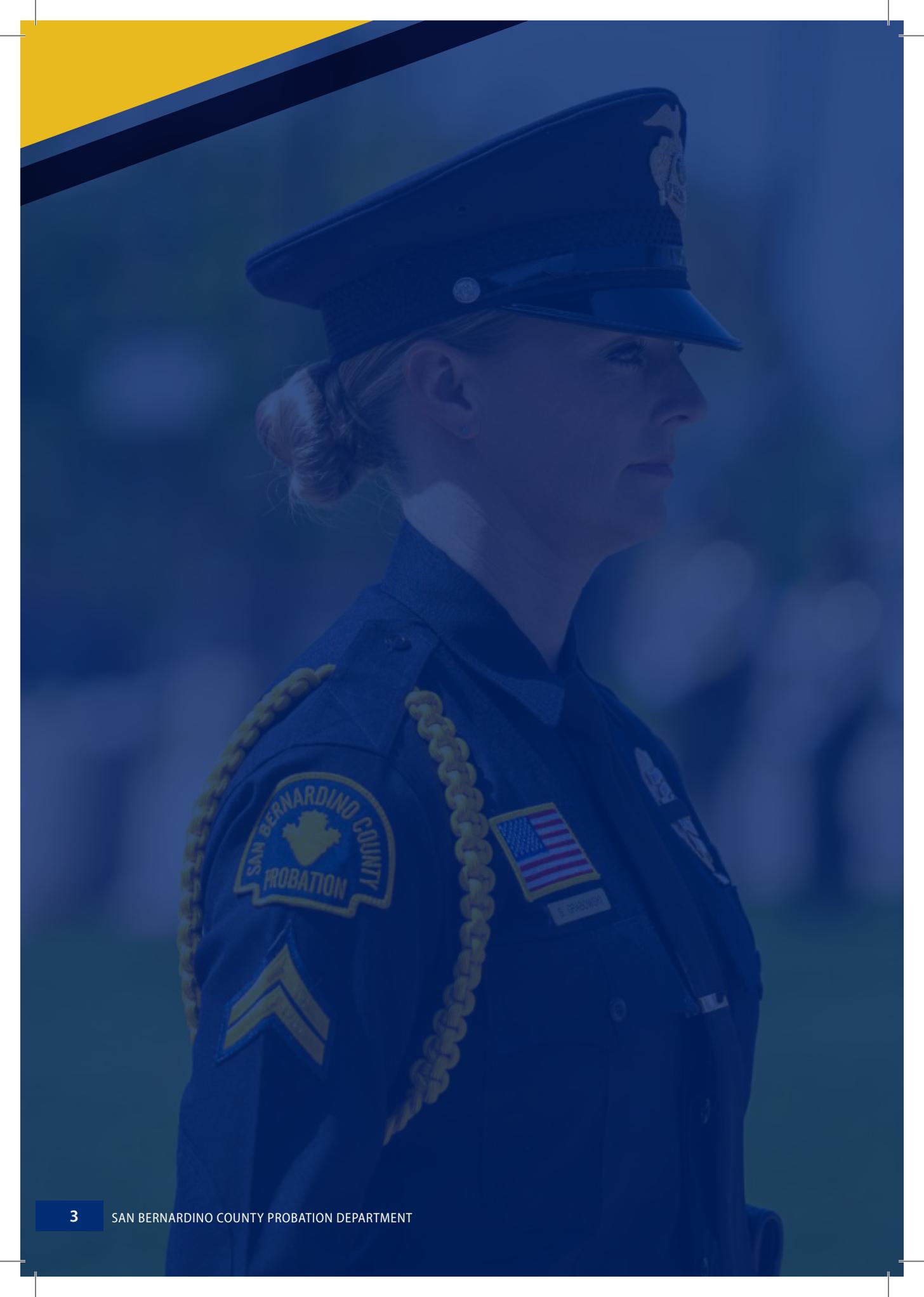

This Annual Report highlights these achievements, affirming that this agency is at the forefront of leadership and innovation in Community Corrections.

The Probation Department maintains fidelity to our core mission of providing exemplary law enforcement and rehabilitative services, building stronger families and safer communities.

However, the department's focus during the past year has also included continuous improvement to our ARISE program, a groundbreaking response to SB 823/SB92 legislation that re-integrates detained, formerly classified DJJ youth, back into our communities. We continue to grow our evidence-based MAP program, an evolutionary approach to comprehensive adult re-entry education and rehabilitation, while spearheading Pre-Trial Supervision Services and resources for our unhoused population.

The past fiscal year has also included growth in our Emergency Services/Emergency Operations Division, which ensures the continuity of our community protection, rehabilitative services, and resource management during critical incidents or regional emergencies.

Of course, these accomplishments are a result of the hard work and dedication of our professional staff, who are our greatest resource. A significant adversity has been the continued challenge posed by a persistent department-wide staffing shortage. Our officers have stepped up to work shifts in our Detention Centers and manage staffing deficiencies in order to preserve the safety and well-being of youth in our care. Administrative units and training center staff have done an extraordinary job of recruiting and training new officers to close the staffing insufficiency to the lowest level in several years.

I am honored to lead this organization of amazing professionals who come to work each day determined to protect our communities and rebuild the lives of the populations we supervise. Thank you for your interest in the San Bernardino County Probation Department. This report will highlight the statistics that demonstrate success in our diverse and valuable mission.

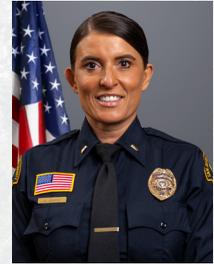

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS DIVISION

Backgrounds Unit

Responsible for completing background investigations on all applicants desiring employment with Probation to include coordinating Physical Agility Testing for all sworn applicants. They also process and issue CCW permits for retired officers.

Custodian of Records

Responsible for receiving, evaluating, and processing all requests for information from both internal and external entities. The Custodian of Record evaluates all requests to ensure compliance with the California Public Records Act and all other applicable laws, policies and procedures.

Internal Affairs Unit

Responsible for conducting administrative investigations arising from allegations of misconduct.

PREA/Compliance Unit

Responsible for investigating all allegations of a failure to abide by state and federal mandates. They also ensure the delivery of training, the maintenance of required records and facilitate the bi-annual PREA Inspection for each facility that houses youth. PREA also conducts investigations into alleged PREA violations as required by Federal PREA Standards.



ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES BUREAU

External Affairs

A multi-faceted unit that supports the department's public relations and communications needs and maintains probation's social media presence. The unit also oversees aspects of the department's inter-communication requirements and public presentations. A multi-media lab produces films and photographs for the department. Recruiting and volunteer management also fall under their sphere of responsibility.

Maintenance

Provides service for all maintenance items and/or service requests department wide.

Policies and Procedures; Audits and Inspections

Creates new procedures where needed and updates existing procedures. The Audits and Inspections Team provides on-going audits of procedures to ensure compliance in all functions and process systems for the Probation Department.

Capital Improvement Project Management

Oversees all capital projects being undertaken by the Probation Department from the financial, approval and design development phases through construction.

Transportation Unit

Provides secure and safe transportation responsibilities and custodial supervision for all in-custody youth movement needs.

Clerical Support Services

CVJDAC and ARISE SYTF

Provides customer service in key roles including reception, issuing facility keys and equipment, and ensuring adequate officer coverage on the daily facility schedule.

Juvenile and Adult Legal Units

Provide services by processing court cases for completion by Probation Officers as well as serve as Liaisons to court personnel. Reception areas provide in-person and phone assistance to Probation Officers and the public.

Support Services

Provides administrative support to the Probation Department. Oversees compliance requirements from the Department of Justice. Assists in the process of clearances and provides mail processing and delivery.

Training Bureau

Annual Training

Probation annual training is a comprehensive program designed to enhance officers' skills, knowledge, and readiness to effectively serve and protect their communities.

Core Training

The basic core training that provides all officers with the essential training, education, and legal foundation knowledge required to serve their communities and provide rehabilitative services.

Field Training Officer Program

This Unit uses experienced officers to mentor and evaluate new recruits in real-world scenarios, ensuring they acquire essential skills and knowledge for effective probation work.

Force Options

This unit educates Probation personnel on the legal and ethical frameworks of use of force, exploring various force options and decision-making strategies to ensure appropriate responses in dynamic situations.

Range Office/Firearms/Scenarios

This unit provides Probation personnel with essential training in firearms safety, handling, marksmanship, and tactical decision-making to ensure effective and responsible use in various operational scenarios.

CCB/DCB Programming/ Data Analysis Units

Data Analysis Unit

Maintains and evaluates accuracy of data in our case management system as well as analyzing the data to assist in decision making.

Programming Unit

Seek and maintain new programming and services to offer those entrusted in our care, whether in detention or in the community, to assist in the reintegration, rehabilitation, and safety of the community.



ADMINISTRATIVE FINANCE DIVISION

Accounts Payable and Purchasing

Accounts Payable and Purchasing processes invoices for services as well as purchases necessary goods and services to support Probation operations.

Contracts and Special Projects

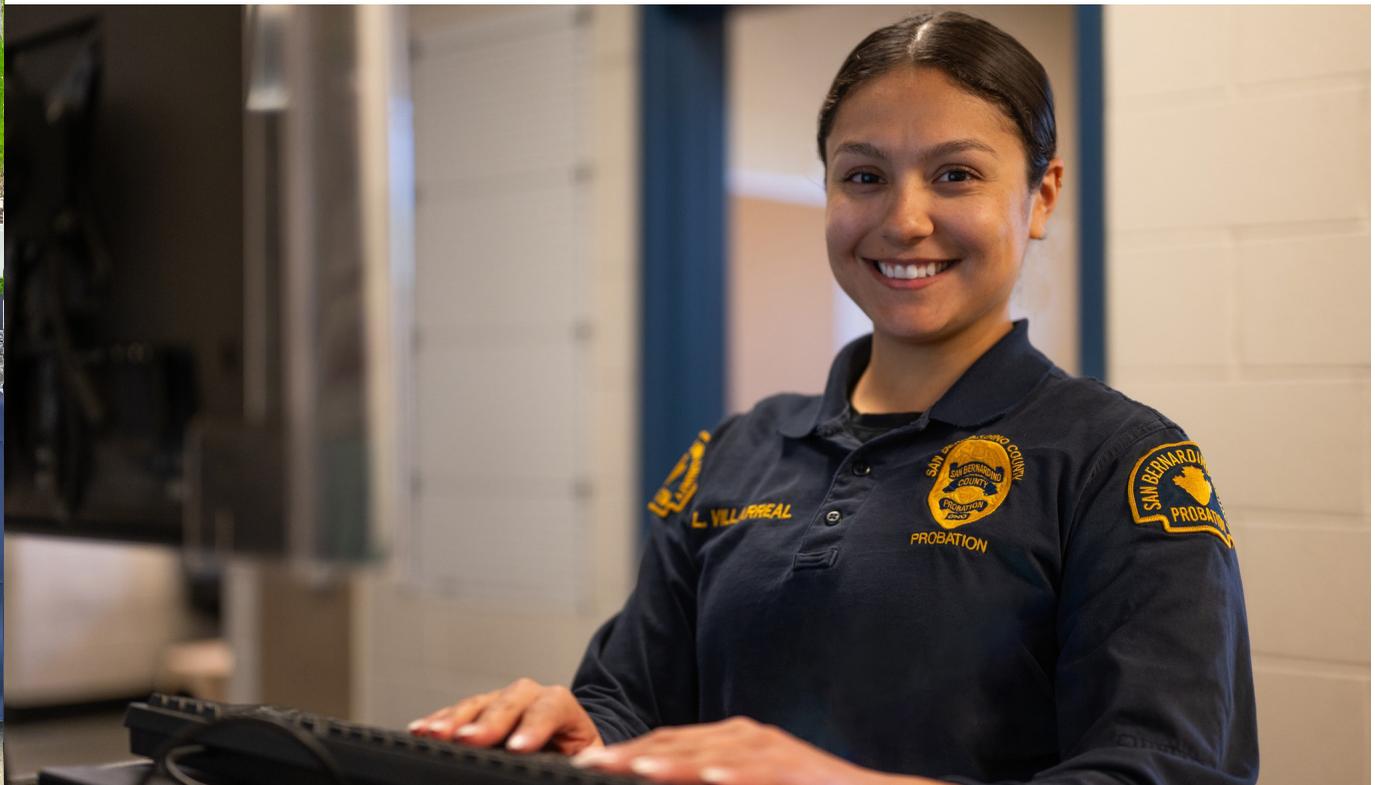
Contracts and Special Projects supports Probation by coordinating grant applications and grant management; drafting, managing and coordinating procurement processes; writing and coordinating contracts/memoranda of understanding/amendments with County and non-County entities for Board of Supervisors and/or Purchasing Department approval; and writing and coordinating Board Agenda Items.

Finance and Accounting

The Finance and Accounting Unit develops Probation's annual budget through the County budget process. The unit monitors and accounts for department spending to ensure expenses are aligned with the annual budget. The Finance and Accounting Unit ensures all necessary accounting reports are accurate and completed on time.

Payroll and Personnel

Payroll and Personnel supports Probation operations by auditing time and attendance and running payroll functions for each pay period for the department. The unit manages the process of accurately paying employees as well as facilitating the integration of new employees with Probation. As well as functioning as the liaison between the department and employees who are on leave.



AUTOMATED SERVICES DIVISION

The Automated Services Division provides the Department and its customers with infrastructure support, business solution analysis/development, and 24-hour support for the hardware and software needs of staff and customers across business lines.

ADULT COMMUNITY SERVICES BUREAU

Central, High Desert, and West Valley Divisions

Case Management Unit

The Case Management Unit supervises medium and high-risk probationers by meeting with them in person, via telephone, and/or via web reporting to ensure they are compliant with their terms and conditions. This unit creates field packets and communicates regularly with the Field Operations Unit regarding the status and progress of each client. Referrals are submitted for clients to receive services and to participate in treatment programs. Incentives are provided for clients performing well, and informal/formal sanctions are implemented for those who are in violation of their terms and conditions. The case management Unit also completes reports and provides recommendations to the Court. The unit assists with field work as needed, provides office coverage, and participates in multi-agency operations.

Field Operations Unit

The Field Operations Unit works in conjunction with the Case Management Unit and is dedicated to monitoring clients in the community through Home Visits and Field Contacts to determine if clients need additional services and ensure compliance with their terms and conditions. The Field Operations Unit conducts home compliance checks, follows up on leads to gather information, completes court reports, and makes arrests for those who are in substantial violation.

By actively engaging with the community and partnering with local law enforcement, the Field Operations Unit works to foster connections and enhance public safety while emphasizing rehabilitation, accountability, and protection of the community.

General Supervision Unit

The General Supervision Unit supervises probationers with a low CAIS Risk score and a minimum risk for recidivism from all regions of the county. Probationers report via web reporting, by telephone, or in person every 90 days. The unit completes reports and provides recommendations to the court. The unit also submits referrals for services and provides incentives.

GPS Unit

The GPS Unit electronically monitors adult and juvenile clients daily and will contact them by phone if they have a critical battery, message gaps in monitoring, no GPS signal, dead or low batteries, possible shielding of whereabouts, master tampering of the device, or exclusion zone alerts, if found in prohibited locations. The unit also deactivates devices that have remained out of order for more than 48 hours and contacts the case agent to follow up as needed. The unit will review tracking information to determine the client's possible location, where the client sleeps, places where the client frequents, and patterns of behavior. A review of the last location where the device was active will be sent to the case agent for the retrieval of devices that are no longer operable.

Out of County Supervision

The unit supervises offenders who are on probation to San Bernardino County but report living in another county. The unit gathers the needed documentation for transfer out of county per PC1203.9, then transfers the case to the Transfer Unit.

Transfer Unit

The unit processes and completes paperwork for cases being transferred to other counties per PC1203.9 and to other states per Interstate Compact. They also receive the cases from other counties and states, process for terms and conditions, and then transfer to supervision.

CCB EMS & CIU

Criminal Intelligence Unit (CIU)

The Criminal Intelligence Unit collects and evaluates information regarding probation offenders to support investigations and ensure the safety of officers, the community and youth in our custody.

Emergency Services Unit (ESU)

The ESU is responsible for preparing and coordinating the Department's emergency response to maintain department operations primarily for the Central Valley Juvenile Detention and Assessment Center (CVJDAC), the ARISE facilities, and maintaining emergency preparedness for the entire Department.

Safety & Security Unit (SSU)

The SSU is responsible for all Department workplace safety needs, maintaining building security internally and externally, and collaborating with the Risk management and Human Resources Departments to address employee safety and security needs.



ADULT SPECIALIZED COMMUNITY SERVICES BUREAU

Central, High Desert and West Valley Divisions

Domestic Violence

Proactively provides supervision and rehabilitation services to those convicted of a Domestic Violence Offense along with offering victim protection and advocacy.

DUI

The DUI Unit supervises felony DUI offenders and ensures compliance with their court ordered terms of probation and that they are completing various components towards their rehabilitation.

Multiple Enforcement Team

Works collaboratively within our department and our local agencies to ensure the citizens of the county are safe by participating in targeted operations in order to reduce violent crimes and the departments warrants.

Sex Offender

Increases community safety by ensuring the proper supervision of offenders who have been convicted of sex-related crimes by working with sexual treatment providers to reduce the risk of recidivism in the community.

Adult Mental Health/ DRC Division

Mental Health Supervision Unit

The Mental Health Unit supervises and provides essential services to adult probationers with mental health needs in collaboration with the Department of Behavioral Health with the overall goal of creating a stable, structured treatment plan to assist the probationers in their reintegration in the community.

Orientation and Assessment / Day Reporting Center Unit (units located in the West End, Desert and San Bernardino)

The Orientation and Assessment and Day Reporting Center Units provides instructions and expectations to probation clients while obtaining pertinent information to provide adequate supervision and assess their needs. This Unit also works in collaboration with several county partners within the Day Reporting Centers to offer resources and treatment services to initiate positive behavior change to be successful which leads to restoration of victims, safer communities, and sustainable success.

Treatment Courts

The Treatment Courts unit utilizes nationally developed, evidence-based practices in collaboration with our justice partners, community stakeholders, and treatment providers to address the specific mental health needs and substance abuse issues of the participants in Drug Court, Mental Health Court, and Veterans Court, to rehabilitate and reintegrate them into the community.

Adult Pretrial Homeless, C.A.R.E, & DUI

C.A.R.E.

The C.A.R.E Unit offers assistance and collaboration with local law enforcement agencies in quality of life matters within each jurisdiction. They assist those needing housing services with outreach while still enforcing the law when specific matters arise.

Homeless Outreach

The Homeless Outreach Unit uniquely serves both unhoused and at-risk individuals in collaboration with community partners to offer assistance, resources and housing.

Pretrial Assessment

Provides assessments to the court regarding a client's likelihood of a future court appearance and potential recidivism. This facilitates judicial officers in making informed decisions concerning pretrial release.

Pretrial Monitoring

Monitors clients who are released from jail while awaiting trial to ensure they comply with the conditions of their release. Pretrial Monitoring works to ensure clients appear at court hearings and do not re-offend after pretrial release, while ensuring protection of the community.



JUVENILE COMMUNITY SERVICES DIVISION

Central, High Desert, West Valley and YJC Divisions

ARISE Community Supervision

Guide youth who have been ordered to satisfy a long-term commitment order while they are in custody and supervise them after their release.

Community Service

This unit manages and plans community service engagement opportunities for youth who have been court ordered to complete community services hours.

CST

Evaluate citations and police reports to determine eligibility of diversion programs versus referrals to the district attorney's office for filing.

Day Reporting Center (DRC)

The Probation Officers in this unit receive referrals from several resources and manage assignment of youth into rehabilitative services and classes provided by contracted providers, plans and operates activities for youth throughout the year and provides various levels of support for pro-social events in the community for youth and families.

Intake/House Arrest

Assess newly arrested youth for appropriateness of detention and provide alternatives to detention via electronic monitoring.

Investigations

Provide the Court with reports to help determine the best course of action for youth who are accused of delinquent conduct.

Placement

Monitor and guide youth who the Court ordered placed out of their home with a resource family or Short Term Residential Therapeutic Program (STRTP).

School Probation Officer Program

Probation Officers are assigned to various schools within the community to provide intervention and prevention services, to mentor youth and assist with overall safety and well-being of youth on campus.

Supervision

Assess, monitor, and provide services to youth who have been placed on court ordered probation aimed at reducing recidivism.

Wraparound/Independent Living

Supervise youth while they engage in programs designed provide supportive services and skillsets to improve their future.

Youth Accountability Board (YAB)

A diversion program run by community members that works with youth who have committed low level offenses with a focus on redirecting youth away from further recidivism.



DETENTION CORRECTIONS BUREAU

ARISE Bureau

ARISE/DJJ Re-Entry Supervision Unit

The ARISE Re-Entry Supervision Unit is comprised of Probation Officers who are responsible for the post release supervision of youth returning from the Department of Juvenile Justice and those released from the Secure Youth Treatment Facility. The Re-Entry Supervision Unit works closely with the ARISE SYTF and SOAR LRTP, by engaging with family members, supportive adults and the community to assist with their re-entry and reduce recidivism.

Secure Youth Treatment Facility (STYF)

ARISE is a Secure Youth Treatment Facility for youth who have been previously committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) and youth who would have otherwise been eligible for commitment to DJJ. The youth committed to the program are between the ages of 14 to 25 years old and have been made wards of the court and their most recent committing offense(s) are found true or admitted as listed in Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) 707(b). The offenses enumerated under WIC 707 (b) include but are not limited to murder, sodomy by force, rape with force/violence or threat of great bodily injury, kidnapping for ransom, assault with a firearm or destructive device or other serious and violent offenses. While housed at ARISE the youth are provided individual and group therapy, specialized treatment and educational/vocational training in preparation for re-entry into the community.

Successful Outcome Achieving Responsibility (SOAR)

SOAR is a Less Restrictive Treatment Program (LRTP) for committed youth in the Juvenile Justice System at ARISE. This step-down program will provide youth with additional treatment, education, rehabilitation, and work force development in preparation for re-entry into the community.

Program currently in development.

Use of Force (UOF) Unit

The UOF Unit reviews and evaluates all Probation Department UOF incidents to identify use of force trends, improve verbal tactics and provide a remediation curriculum for implementing methods to avoid use of force incidents.

Central Valley Juvenile Detention and Assessment Center (CVJDAC)

CVJDAC

A secure facility for youth who are detained for violating criminal laws and are provided services to maintain family dynamics through visitation, continue their education, pursue religious beliefs, medical and psychological assessment and treatment, and life skills for rehabilitation to decrease to recidivism.

Food Services and Medical Services Divisions

Food Service

Providing balance nutritional meals to the youth that meet their dietary needs based on age guidelines for a healthier lifestyle thou minimizing future medical deficiencies, in addition supporting facility Staff with a diverse selection of meals during their tour of duty.

Medical Services

The Medical Services Division provides comprehensive healthcare services within the correctional facility environment, ensuring that all care meets or exceeds community standards and aligns with regulatory requirements, including Title 15 of the California Code of Regulations and standards established by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care (NCCHC).

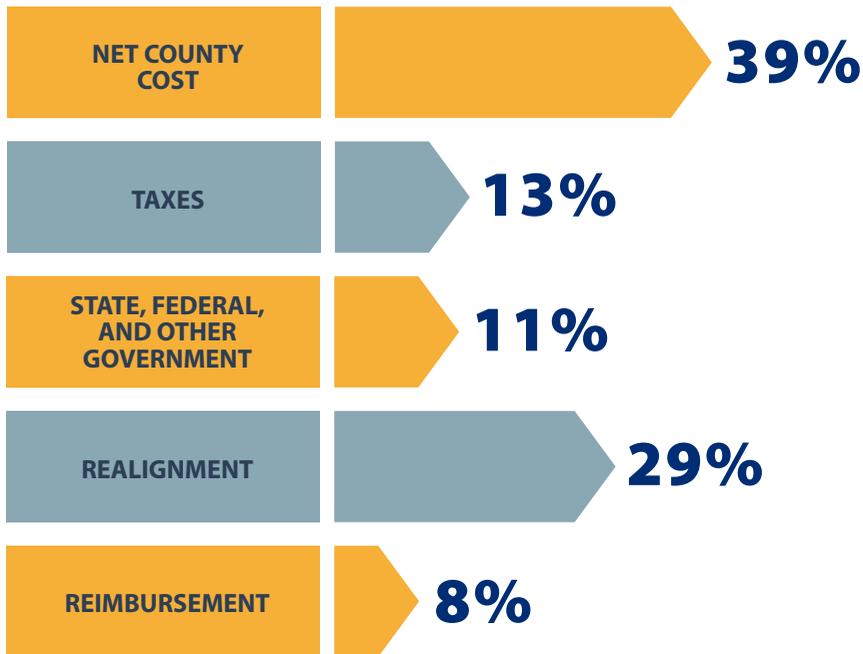

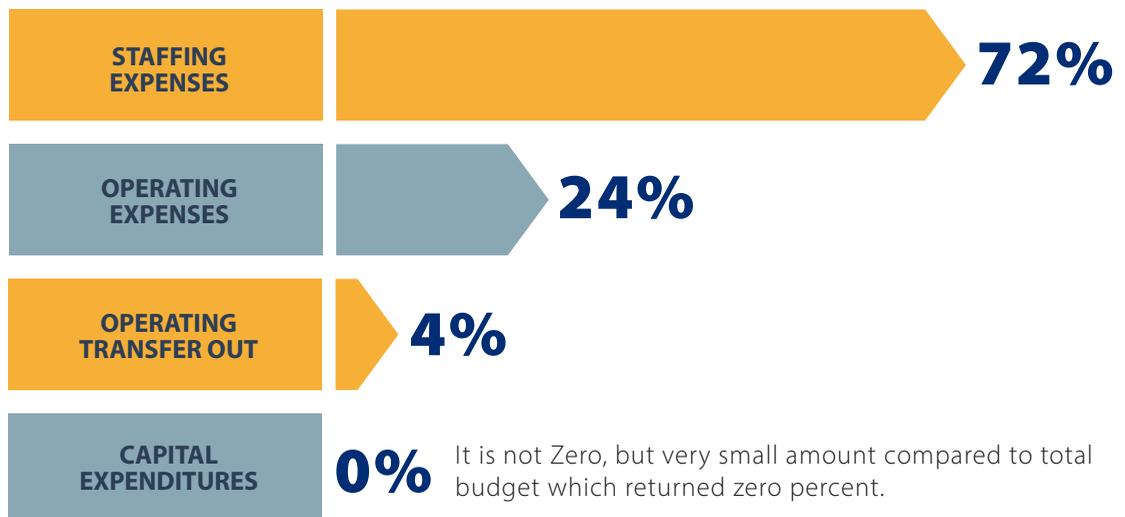

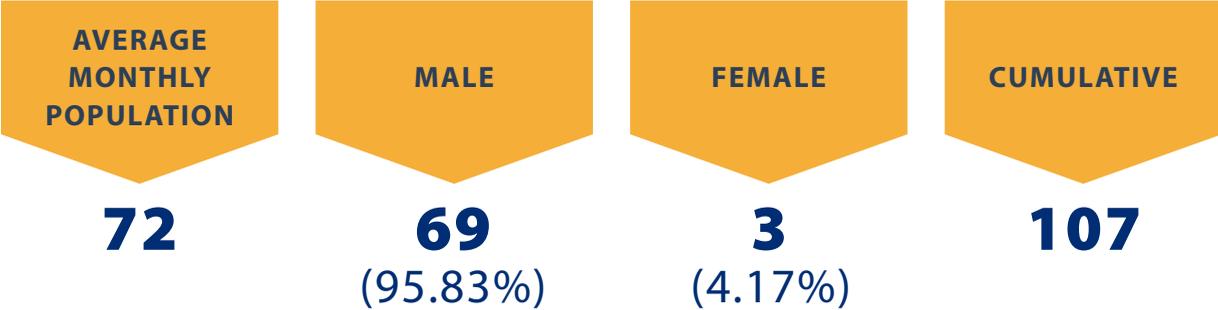
