4. Presentation / Program Updates	<p>1) Probation Update - Multidimensional Anti-recidivism Partnership (M.A.P.) – Chief Reece</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. M.A.P. Program is going well in the Central region b. Currently working on a lease agreement for a location in the West End to provide services <p>2) Sheriff Department Update – FAITHS Program – Sheriff Shannon Dicus and Lt. Laura Addy</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. FAITHS provided in-house therapeutic services and external services b. The FAITHS' external classes were not occurring and Cal State was unable to provide data on exterior programming; as a result, the Sheriff's Department parted ways with FAITHS c. Lt. Addy provided additional information on how that funding was redirected <ul style="list-style-type: none"> o The division has grown significantly over the years, including four drug and alcohol counselors, 4 social workers, additional support staff, several rehabilitation classes, Sheriff's Transitional Assistant Reentry Team (START)

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ During FY24-25, FAITHS data showed 430 people were enrolled, with 181 completing the programming; Sheriff’s internal data showed 2,330 people were enrolled, with 1,869 completing the programming <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Sheriff’s data shows success in placing people when released from custody into rehabilitative and restorative services, especially with substance use disorders d. Per Sheriff Dicus, there was no break in service other than the period they were unaware of Cal State’s investigation e. Questions/Discussion Items <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ With the new programming, is the scope of the targeted population the same as what the original was? Per the Sheriff, yes, it is. ○ Are there any collaborative efforts with the existing infrastructure that the CCP funding has already created to make sure there is no duplication of services, but to capitalize on some? Currently, there is no duplication of services between agencies ○ How are the individuals identified to participate in START, and can the other agencies refer individuals as well? The Sheriff’s Department runs an internal report using its Jail Management System. The report identifies the top 100 utilizers who are repeat offenders. It does not include those on probation or parole. The focus is on those who will be released within 90 days. Other agencies can also make referrals. ○ Discussed funding and the need for a comprehensive analysis of the data on current programming ○ Recommendation to agendaize a vote to move funding from FAITHS to a new program utilized by the Sheriff’s Department 3) Public Defender Update – Transportation – Thomas Sone <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. The Public Defender’s office averages 40 to 50 transports a month to clients who are part of the San Bernardino Drug Court, Veterans Court, and Mental Health Court; all Treatment Courts were transferred to the West Valley region

Overall flat with a projection of 1.17% increase in the first few months of the fiscal year b. Overall, statewide, AB109 is coming in at a 1.89% increase for two months; not enough data to see what is trending 2) Ongoing Budget <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Cost to Maintain Services – will continue to monitor funding b. One-Time Funding - \$7.7 million above the 20% reserve <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ If one-time funding is available, an email will be sent to the committee requesting proposals in January, for a review/vote on the allocation of resources in March
