Many kids and their families attended. She enjoyed seeing little girls with their dads teaching them how to fish. Probation held the Independent Living Program Health Fair. It was also a huge success. The School Probation Officer Program was able to help 24 youth from Rancho Cucamonga Middle School. The youth were transported to the Center for Drug-Free Communities, Peer Assistant Leadership Program's ropes course in Orange County. Youth learned to help each other. They lifted each other up, overcame obstacles, climbed walls, and went down zip lines. They learned teamwork, courage, to overcome their fears, and to work together as one. Juvenile Hall and ARISE will soon be holding their high school graduation. It is always a spectacular event for the youth who are graduating.
